Before I got into the Passages program I was a high school dropout. I struggled a lot in regular high school and didn't learn anything. Well, when I heard about the Passages program, I was excited. I got in and learned a lot more. This is a great program because the teachers work around your schedule and you do your work on your own. Now I'm graduating from high school because of this program.

Job Shadowing in the W.I.C.U.

I job shadowed in the Women and Infants Care Unit; I learned so much. Back in 1987 the starting pay for a registered nurse was \$8.75 per hour and now it's around \$20.00. While I was job shadowing I got to see a baby born, which was amazing, and a circumcision done, which was nasty. The nurses in the W.I.C.U are amazing - they're great with their patients. They enjoy what they do for work.

What I liked about job shadowing in the W.I.C.U is that the R.N.s were so great with the mothers after they had their babies and during labor. They wait on the mothers if they need anything; they are calm, even with mothers who don't care about their babies. While I was watching a baby born, I thought it was going to be so nasty, but it's not. The nurses would check the baby's heartbeat every five minutes to make sure the baby isn't under stress. I got to watch Dr. Newsom break the amniotic sac. It looked like a hook that they stick in the vagina. Once they get ahold of the sac, they tug and then it's a waiting period.

A lot of things have changed in a year in the W.I.C.U. They now have a thing called postpartum appointments, which is when mommy and baby go back for a checkup two days after the baby goes home. They do not do an episiotomy for the most part; they let women tear unless it's an emergency. They also stopped having the parent be in the room when they do a circumcision.

What I didn't like about job shadowing was that some of the nurses are kind of rough with the babies. Also, some of the nurses weren't happy because they couldn't get the help they needed when they wanted it because they were understaffed. I didn't like watching the circumcision and see the baby in pain, but other than that, it wasn't bad.

Why I think this would be good for me is because I love babies and I feel like I could do just as good a job as other nurses. I would like to go get my L.P.N. degree and work with babies and mothers. I feel like I could make mothers feel comfortable while in labor and after having a child.

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My Passage: Pricing My Wares

Through my adventures in price research I have learned that pricing is one of the hardest parts of owning your own business. This is because if you charge too much, it will not be successful, but if you don't charge enough you will not be valued for your time and work. As I read more articles I found that many people price things by doubling what they pay for products. I have also read about people comparing pricing, which is looking online, finding someone with the same skill as you, and pricing about the same or a little less for competitive pricing.

When I decided to bring my prices up I looked around etsy. I soon realized what my letters could go for and I upped the price without matching etsy prices. I priced them a couple dollars cheaper, so I am able to say I have the cheapest letters around.

I also learned how to prepare for an art show. It begins with being sure to do an art show locally. This saves you money on gas, hotel expenses, etc. Also, I learned about booth rentals, which can range from \$20-\$500+. The most informative thing I have learned is to NOT change prices a lot. This makes customers think you are dishonest. If deciding to drop the price it is good to say, "Due to availability of certain items, prices are subject to change." In another article I read pricing too low can discourage customers, because it makes them think your product is cheap. A good tip I learned is minimum wage jobs are for people who have an easy job. A craft job is not always a job a customer can do, so you would charge roughly \$10 an hour unless you're experienced, then you would charge close to \$20 an hour. Then after calculating all that, you double what you have calculated and double again for retail.

In conclusion, I have been under pricing my work and I have found many ways and explanations on how to figure out a good, fitting price range for all my hard work. I have raised my prices and when I am judged on how high my prices are I feel like I would have a good explanation on how I calculated them.
